Laura is an Assistant Professor in the Department of Sociology at Temple University.



Dr. Orrico uses qualitative and ethnographic methods to examine everyday experiences of precarity, particularly in the urban context. Her work pays close attention to the way ethnographic research takes shape across time and space, and she has published on the embodied experience of ethnographic research as a form of intimacy.



Ecem Ece is a joint degree PhD/MA student in Sociology and Gender, Sexuality, and Women's Studies. In their current work, they focus on the spatio-temporal dynamics of violence and queer activism in Turkey, incorporating digital ethnography as one of their research methods. Their research interests also encompass queer migration, queer feminist spaces and geographies, as well as queer and feminist methodologies.
