COURSE GOALS AND OBJECTIVES

From the course catalog: Examines discrimination and health from a variety of perspectives. Explores links of discrimination experiences with health behaviors and outcome, discrimination in healthcare settings, and routes to improving health at individual, group, and legislative levels. Addresses multiple forms of discrimination (e.g., race, sex, class, sexual orientation/gender identity) and their intersections.

By the end of the course, students will:

- List and discuss physical and mental health challenges and disparities faced by populations targeted by discrimination.
- Analyze how social and environmental factors create, contribute to, and exacerbate health challenges for people targeted by discrimination.
- Evaluate how multiple systems of power and oppression interlock to shape individuals' experience of the world and impact their health.

Content Warning: we will be tackling hard topics in this class, looking directly at material related to oppression, COVID-19 and other illnesses, and untimely death. My aim is that we will do so in a way that is educational, empowering, and hopeful. However, I acknowledge that some people may not have the bandwidth to tackle these topics at this moment in time. If that is the case for you, I urge you to consult with me and/or choose a different class instead.

Students are encouraged to employ critical thinking and to rely on data and verifiable sources to interrogate all assigned readings and subject matter in this course as a way of determining whether they agree with their classmates and/or their instructor. No lesson is intended to espouse, promote, advance, inculcate, or compel a particular feeling, perception, viewpoint or belief.

This class counts as a social science or gender and science course for Women's Studies majors; an HESJ elective for students with the Health Equity and Social Justice specialization; a TPS elective for majors or minors in Theories and Politics of Sexuality; and as a category A or B elective for the Health Disparities in Society minor.

In-class recording

Students are allowed to record video or audio of class lectures. However, the purposes for which these recordings may be used are strictly controlled. Publication without permission of the instructor is prohibited. Additionally, a recording, or transcript of a recording, is considered published if it is posted on or uploaded to, in whole or in part, any media platform, including but not limited to social media, book, magazine, newspaper, leaflet, or third-party-note/tutoring services. A student who publishes a recording without written consent may be subject to a civil cause of action instituted by a person injured by the publication and/or discipline under UF Regulation 4.040 Student Honor Code and Student Conduct Code.
