Course Description

This course explores the social construction of gender, sexuality, race, class, and other identity categories. Readings focus on individuals, families, and cultural groups, mainly in the US but with attention to other nations. It includes subjects as intimate as the body and violence and as pervasive as politics and the law. It emphasizes differences in daily life experiences of health care, education, sports, and religion. It also examines the potential of movements for social change.

Note: This course covers a variety of ideas and views about the topics of focus, taught as objects of analysis within the larger course of instruction. Emphasis is on critical thinking, examination of evidence, and evaluation of arguments. No lesson is intended to compel a particular feeling or belief. Endorsing or agreeing with a particular view is not expected or required.

II. Course Goals

Course Objectives

This course will:

- Introduce foundational social science perspectives and concepts related to gender and sexuality, with attention to how these interact with factors such as age, class, and race.
- Examine real-world applications of gender and sexuality frameworks through analysis of topics like healthcare, media, marriage, and political engagement in both U.S. and global contexts.
- Develop critical thinking and analytical skills to interpret and assess diverse lived experiences of individuals, families, and cultural groups regarding gender and sexuality.

Student Learning Outcomes

A student who successfully completes this course will be able to:

- Describe key social science perspectives related to gender and sexuality.
- Discuss and evaluate perspectives on how gender and sexuality function in society and everyday life.
- Analyze evidence of people's experiences related to gender and sexuality in different social contexts.

III. Graded Work

Overview of Graded Components

Quizzes (33 points): These assignments are designed to reinforce students' understanding of fundamental concepts from the readings. Each quiz is worth 3 points and consists of 6 multiple-choice questions focusing on key terms and foundational ideas essential for progressing through the course material.

Discussion and Response Posts (33 points): Discussion Post (2 pts): Students are required to reflect on the prompt, utilizing key concepts, sharing insights, and providing thoughtful analysis incorporating examples. Response Post (1 pt): Students are expected to engage with one of their classmates' posts by adding meaningful commentary and furthering the discussion.

Response Papers (Writing Requirement) (24 points): Response papers (each worth 12 points) help students identify and develop an understanding of the construction of social scientific knowledge and develop reading and writing skills. They are due no later than the listed time/day. Papers must be 1000-1100 words each and submitted in Word format via Canvas. This will total the 2000-word writing requirement.

Presentation (10 points): This presentation assignment (worth 10 pts) allows students to explore a topic related to media and popular culture (Chapter 10 in the textbook) and share their findings. Students will select a specific theme, issue, or example within this field and deliver a 10–15-minute presentation. Presentations should provide a clear overview of the chosen topic, include relevant examples, and make connections to course readings and materials to demonstrate an understanding of key concepts. Supporting materials such as slides, images, or videos are encouraged to enhance the presentation. Students are expected to organize their presentations effectively, stay within the scheduled time, and communicate their ideas clearly. Presentations will be submitted as a video recording on Canvas (Students are not required to turn on their cameras during the presentation, but they are expected to share their slides via screen sharing.)
