COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course places women and feminism in a transnational perspective, focusing on various theories and movements engendered by women in contemporary national contexts. Development, reproductive politics, women's health, etc. will be examined.

COURSE GOALS AND LEARNING OBJECTIVES

By the end of this course students will be expected to gain mastery of the following topics and issues:

- 1. Gain an understanding of gender as a central category of analysis that informs the way social structures and global structures are legitimized and normalized
- 2. Analyze historical and contemporary systems of privilege and oppression, with special attention to the ways gender intersects with race, class/caste, ethnicity, sexuality, religion, and nationality
- 3. Gain a self-critical awareness of the instability of identity categories and the situated, partial, and political nature of all fields of knowledge
- 4. Think critically about the intersections of national, regional, and global communities and how they impact gender sovereignty
- 5. Describe the relationship between past empires and present ones
- 6. Develop interdisciplinary frameworks for understanding popular tropes of "western" and "non-western"
- 7. Define and distinguish between transnational, international, multinational, global feminism
